been This has year one continued growth, meaningful deepened partnerships, and impact. Across Highland, our team has worked tirelessly to deliver our prevention workshops to children in their early years, equipping them with the confidence, language, and strategies recognise to respond to unsafe situations. We remain committed to creating communities where children are respected, listened to. and empowered to stay safe.

In response to growing need, we have expanded our programme to include emotional wellbeing workshops and bullying awareness sessions in both primary and secondary schools. These sessions support children and young people build resilience, understand their rights, and foster kinder, more inclusive environments. Alongside this. we have delivered professional training to educators, practitioners, and partner organisations-strengthening shared commitment safeguarding and prevention across sectors.

Our work has extended beyond the classroom, with new initiatives promoting kindness, inclusion, and respect as part of our wider approach to bullying prevention.

We have also started to collaborate with local groups and schools to celebrate diversity and challenge discrimination wherever it occurs.

As we reflect on the year gone by, we want to thank our dedicated team, our partner organisations, and the families who welcome us into their schools and communities. Your support ensures we can continue to empower the youngest members of our society to live safe, strong, and free.



WHAT WE DO

At Safe Strong and Free Highland, we are dedicated to helping children and young people aged 4 to 18 grow up safe, strong, and free from harm. Through early intervention and preventative education, we equip them with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to recognise unsafe situations and respond in ways that support their safety and wellbeing.

We deliver engaging, age-appropriate workshops across a range of topics tailored to different stages of a child's development. Our core programmes focus on:



We work in close partnership with schools, early years settings, parents, carers, and professionals, ensuring our messages are reinforced across the environments where children live and learn. By building strong relationships with our communities, we aim to create a consistent and positive safety culture.

Overall Impact

- 7,815 children reached across the Highlands.
- 800 workshops delivered to nurture safety, confidence, and emotional health.
- The largest engagement came from nursery-aged children, fostering early awareness and prevention.
- Special focus on Emotional Wellbeing and Bullying Prevention, supporting over 480 children through dedicated sessions.
- Over 1,700 community members engaged through public events, extending our impact beyond schools.


Our programs are making a real difference:

Promoting a Culture of Kindness and Respect

As part of our ongoing commitment to early intervention and prevention, this year we developed a comprehensive set of bullying awareness materials aimed at supporting children, families, and schools across Highland.

Recognising the lasting impact bullying can have on a child's wellbeing, confidence, and educational attainment, our new resources are designed to empower children and young people to recognise bullying behaviour and seek support safely.

What We Developed:

- A guide for parents, carers, and children/young people, offering clear, practical advice on recognising, preventing, and responding to bullying behaviour.
- Bright, engaging posters for primary and secondary schools, reinforcing key messages around kindness and being an upstander.
- Workshop content that complements our culture of kindness.

Posters have already been displayed in several schools, sparking conversations among pupils, and contributing to a more inclusive school climate.




OUR FUNDS



Income

Throughout the year SSF received income of £195,505 from a variety of organisations for both the core workshops and projects. Income was received in this financial year for projects that would be delivered in the next financial year, with funds carried forward of £91,526. The breakdown of income is shown in the chart to the right.

OUR FUNDS



During the year SSF received a huge increase in donations (815% compared to the previous year). This increase was due to the support received by Morrison construction and especially a member of their staff who undertook a sponsored climb of Kilimanjaro to raise funds for SSF.

Expenditure

During the financial year SSF incurred an increase in expenditure to £146,499 (5.8% increase on the previous year). The main contributor to this increase was a 10% increase in salary levels. However SSF continued to manage expenditure throughout the financial year. This increase in expenditure was offset by an increase in grant income.



NEXT STEPS

Building a Safer, Kinder Future Together



As we continue to grow and deepen our impact, we are excited to launch three key projects that build on our commitment to children's safety, wellbeing, and positive relationships:

1. Stronger Together

A collaborative initiative bringing Safe Strong and Free Highland together with ACAHMA. This project will:

- Address bullying, racism, and discrimination through workshops and community events.
- Celebrate diversity and inclusion by promoting respect and understanding.
- Empower children, families & professionals to challenge and respond to bullying and prejudice.
- Promote respect, equality and dignity across communities.

2. Rights and Respect

A new program designed to:

- Teach children about their fundamental rights in a way that is accessible and age-appropriate.
- Increase awareness of honour based violence.
- Challenge harmful attitudes and stereotypes.
- Collaborate with community partners and cultural organisations.

3. Promoting a Culture of Kindness to Prevent Bullying Our ongoing commitment to nurture kindness as a foundation for safe communities will focus on:

- Delivering workshops and campaigns that highlight the power of empathy, inclusion, and respect.
- Supporting teachers, parents, and children with practical strategies to prevent bullying.
- Measuring the impact of kindness-focused interventions to continuously improve our approach.

These projects reflect our vision of a community where every child feels safe, valued, and empowered.
