Chairwoman Statement

"We aim to continue helping children develop resilience and equip them with the skills they need to become safe, healthy and well-adjusted adults."

The Safe Strong & Free organisation has had another very busy year. Kerry Lowe continues to spearhead new projects aimed at preventing harm to children, whilst continuing the fundamental pre-school sessions empowering children to stay safe. The latter were delivered to 4,998 pre-school children during the last academic year, alongside primary school update sessions.

In recognition of her increased leadership role, Kerry is now recognised as our Chief Executive Officer and Kath Kernaghan, who provides great support to Kerry and the wider team, is now our Project Co-ordinator.

There have been some changes within the team this year and the Board and I would like to record our thanks and best wishes to those who have moved on, including Angela Ogilvie, Norma Holm and Jo Guthrie. We also extend a warm welcome to Saleema Miah & Lorin Cameron.



The organisation continues to apply for and receive widespread sponsorship and grant funding, which is detailed within our accounts, alongside generous support from Highland Council and other funders.

Kerry presented a poster at the International Society for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (ISPCAN) conference last year and this has led to further networking opportunities and international connections.

We are also delighted that Safe Strong & Free has recently been welcomed as an ISPCAN Country Partner.

This year, the Stronger Together project and toolkit have been developed to help schools tackle racism and promote inclusion. The toolkit was launched at an event in the Town House and has received interest from organisations across Scotland.

The Rights & Respect project will be explained later in the programme and I look forward to learning more about this important new initiative.

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Prevention through Education

Every child deserves to grow up safe, strong and free from abuse. Yet too often, intervention happens only after harm has occurred. We believe the greatest opportunity to protect children lies in prevention, equipping them with the knowledge, confidence and skills to recognise unsafe situations, build healthy relationships and know where to turn for help.

Education is one of the most powerful safeguarding tools available. By creating safe spaces for open conversations from an early age, we help children understand topics such as personal safety, bullying, consent, healthy relationships, inclusion, emotional wellbeing and respect. Prevention not only reduces risk but also empowers children to make informed decisions, challenge harmful behaviours and develop the resilience needed to thrive.

Safe Strong & Free delivers evidence-informed, age-appropriate workshops and resources for children and young people from early years through to secondary school. Alongside our work with children, we provide training and support for parents, carers, educators and professionals, recognising that safeguarding is most effective when entire communities share the knowledge, confidence and responsibility to keep children safe.

Our approach is rooted in children's rights, partnership and early intervention. By working collaboratively with schools, community organisations and statutory partners, we are helping to build environments where children feel safe, respected, included and able to speak up, creating lasting change through prevention rather than reaction.

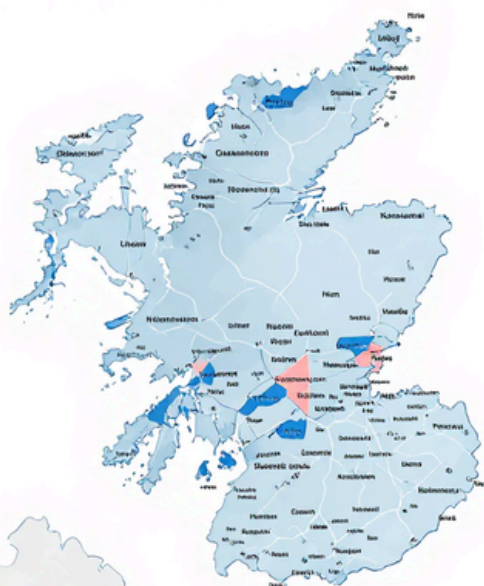

Community Engagement

Safe Strong & Free believes that preventing harm to children is a shared responsibility. Alongside our education programmes, we have continued to build meaningful relationships with communities, faith groups, businesses and partner organisations to create safer, more inclusive environments where children and young people can thrive.

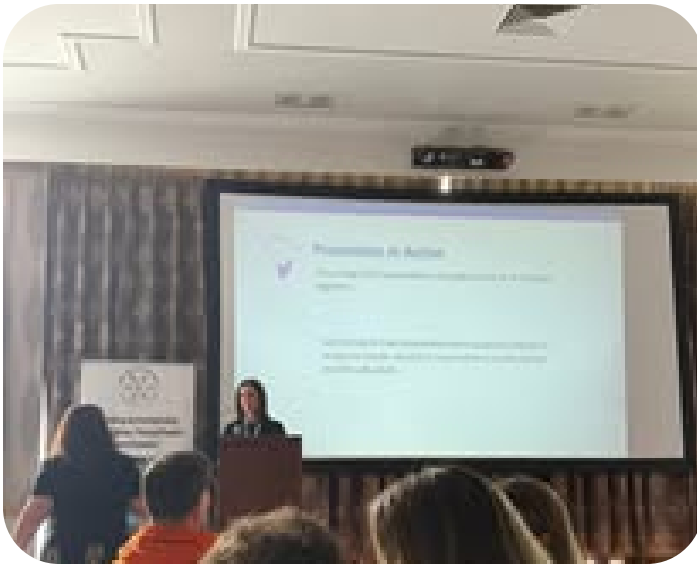
Throughout the year, we strengthened our partnership with Inverness Mosque through community engagement sessions and participation in Eid celebrations, creating opportunities to build trust, improve understanding and promote safeguarding within diverse communities. We were also proud to support Refugee Week, celebrating inclusion, belonging and the importance of welcoming every child and family into our communities.



Collaboration remains central to our approach. Working in partnership with Police Scotland, we co-delivered a bullying prevention workshop, combining our expertise to help children and young people better understand bullying, respectful relationships, reporting concerns and the role everyone plays in creating safer school communities.

We were also invited to share our work at the Highland Child Protection Conference, where we highlighted the importance of prevention, early intervention and belonging as protective factors in keeping children safe. At the Highland Third Sector Interface Conference, we delivered interactive workshops and joined sector leaders to explore how organisations can work together to strengthen communities and prevent harm before it occurs.

Community support has continued to be instrumental in helping us achieve our mission. We were honoured to present the Community Shield Award to Born to Lose Motorcycle Club following their remarkable fundraising challenge, raising £1,650 to support our prevention work. This recognition reflects the strength of community partnerships and the shared commitment to improving outcomes for children and young people.



By working alongside communities, sharing knowledge and strengthening partnerships, we are helping to build a culture where prevention is everyone's responsibility and every child has the opportunity to grow up safe, strong and free.





Community Colour Run

Inverness, 2026 — families, friends and four-legged supporters came together for a day of colour, community and celebration.



Over 200 participants raised funds while celebrating inclusivity and wellbeing across the Highlands.

The Community Colour Run brought together over 200 participants of all ages across Inverness in a vibrant celebration of inclusivity, wellbeing and togetherness. Families, friends and even four-legged supporters joined the fun, raising vital funds for Safe Strong and Free's programmes across the Highlands.

The event was supported by local businesses and volunteers, with music, kindness pebbles and refreshments creating a festival atmosphere. Funds raised will directly support our work delivering prevention programmes in 2026

ISPCAN Congress & International Collaboration

Lithuania 2025 — presenting our prevention model on the international stage at the ISPCAN International Congress.

In September 2025, Safe Strong and Free delivered a poster presentation at the ISPCAN International Congress on Child Abuse and Neglect in Lithuania. This was a significant milestone for the organisation, providing an opportunity to share our prevention-focused model with researchers, practitioners and policymakers from across the world.

Our presentation outlined the development of our Prevention of Child Abuse Programme and how early intervention and preventative education can empower children and young people to recognise and respond to abuse.

The congress brought together over 1,500 delegates from more than 80 countries, creating a unique space for shared learning and collaboration. Presenting alongside leading international organisations reinforced the quality and relevance of our approach.

Participation in the conference enabled us to learn from global research and best practice, develop new professional networks and explore innovative approaches being used internationally.

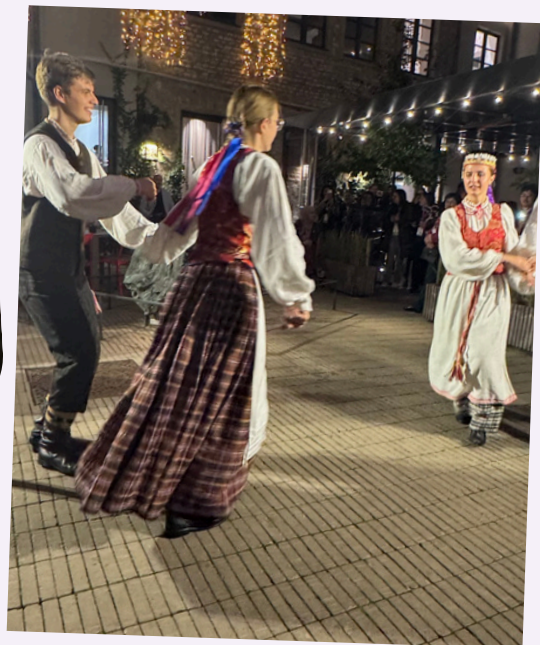
The experience has informed the development of our continuum and strengthened our commitment to prevention and early intervention as the foundation of child protection.

National & International Recognition

As part of our visit, we donated a selection of Safe Strong and Free resources to a school supporting Ukrainian children. The donation reflected our commitment to sharing preventative education and child safety messages beyond our local communities and demonstrated how simple, practical resources can support children's wellbeing regardless of location or circumstance.

Beyond the conference itself, experiencing Lithuanian culture provided valuable insight into how communities can come together to support children and families during times of crisis. We learned about Lithuania's response to welcoming Ukrainian refugees, where schools, community organisations and local services worked collaboratively to help children feel safe, included and able to continue their education despite the trauma of displacement.

Witnessing this compassionate, community-led approach reinforced the importance of belonging as a protective factor for children. It demonstrated how safeguarding extends beyond formal services and is strengthened when communities embrace inclusion, remove barriers and ensure every child has the opportunity to feel valued, connected and supported.

International Learning – Bangladesh

This year, our Project Worker, Saleema, travelled to Bangladesh, the country she proudly describes as her motherland, to strengthen relationships, learn from local communities and deepen our understanding of the challenges affecting children and young people.

During her visit, she met with schools, community organisations and local professionals, gaining first-hand insight into the barriers many children face in accessing education and protection. While education is free and protected by law in the United Kingdom, Saleema witnessed how, in Bangladesh, access to education is often determined by poverty, family circumstances and economic hardship. She saw how some girls leave school because of early marriage proposals, while some boys leave to undertake child labour to support their families. These experiences reinforced that the right to education is not only a fundamental children's right, but also one of the strongest protective factors in preventing abuse, exploitation and poverty.

Saleema also reflected on the richness of Bangladesh's culture, language and strong family values, recognising that culture can be a powerful protective factor when communities work together to uphold children's rights.



Her visit reinforced the importance of listening to communities, understanding different lived experiences and ensuring safeguarding approaches are culturally informed while always keeping children's rights at the centre.

The learning gained from Bangladesh will continue to shape our work across the Highlands, strengthening our Rights & Respect programme and our commitment to ensuring every child regardless of their background, has the opportunity to be safe, heard and realise their right to learn, thrive and reach their full potential.

Programme Development & Innovation

Launch of Stronger Together

This year saw the launch of Stronger Together, our new prevention programme focused on promoting inclusion, celebrating diversity and tackling bullying, racism and discrimination. Developed in response to growing concerns around prejudice-based bullying and the changing needs of communities across the Highlands, Stronger Together takes a proactive approach to building understanding, respect and belonging among children and young people. The programme encourages participants to explore identity, challenge stereotypes, celebrate differences and develop the confidence to become positive allies within their schools and communities.



Safe Strong & Free's commitment to prevention, inclusion and partnership reflects the kind of upstream approach that helps create safer communities for children and young people. Stronger Together provides practical tools that empower schools to build respectful relationships, challenge harmful behaviours and foster cultures where everyone belongs.

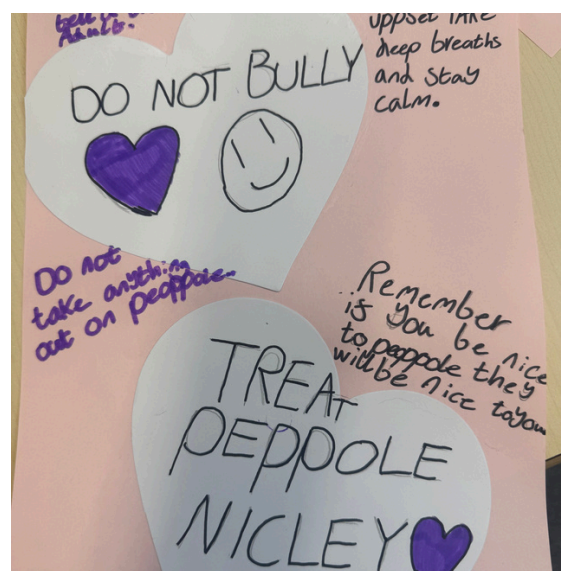

Programme Development & Innovation



Throughout the year, resources, workshops and training materials were developed to support schools, youth groups and community organisations in creating environments where everyone feels safe, valued and respected. Stronger Together represents an important step in expanding our preventative work and responding to emerging issues affecting children and young people. As communities across the Highlands continue to become more diverse, Stronger Together aims to support positive relationships, reduce discrimination and help create a stronger sense of belonging for all.



Rights & Respect

A significant milestone this year was our Rights & Respect Launch Event, which brought together professionals, community members, faith leaders and partner organisations to explore how we can work collectively to protect children and promote equality. We were honoured to welcome representatives from different faiths, including the Imam from Inverness Mosque, reflecting our shared commitment to preventing abuse through understanding, education and collaboration.

The programme includes workshops for children and young people, parent engagement sessions, professional training and practical resources designed to build confidence in recognising unhealthy behaviours, understanding consent and knowing where to seek support. Rather than focusing solely on responding to abuse, Rights & Respect aims to prevent harm before it occurs by empowering individuals with knowledge, confidence and safe opportunities to speak up.



Throughout the year we have continued to strengthen relationships with diverse communities across the Highlands, delivering community engagement sessions, supporting dialogue around safeguarding and promoting inclusion. These partnerships are helping to break down barriers, reduce stigma and ensure prevention messages reach those who may previously have been underserved.

Rights & Respect reflects our belief that every child has the right to grow up safe, respected and free from abuse. By working alongside communities rather than imposing solutions, we are creating sustainable change that protects children while celebrating the diversity and strengths within our communities.

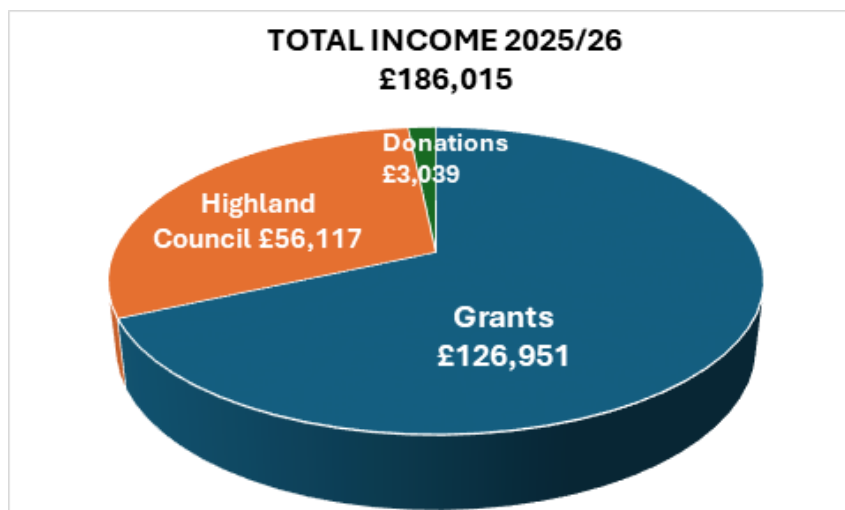

Income

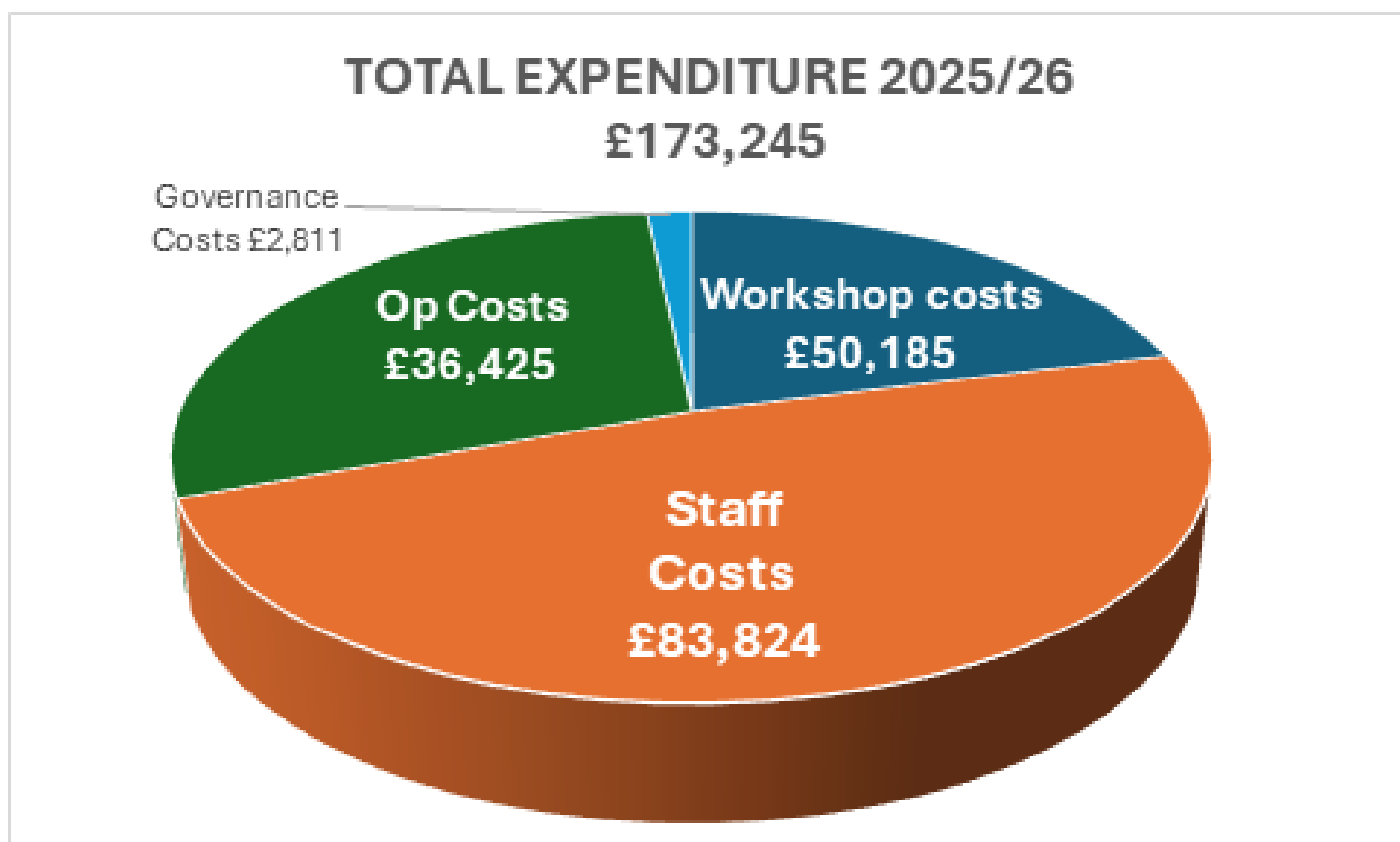

Expenditure

Expenditure in the year increased to £173,245 (12% increase on previous year). The increase in costs was due to an increase in salary (associated to the Stronger Together project, a new SSF website, and project cost associated with the Stronger Together project. The costs for the website and the Stronger Together project costs (including salary) are offset by grant funding.

We look forward to building on these relationships and bringing new ideas, evidence and opportunities to the communities we serve.
